Fleet Surgeon's Corner

An Aspirin A Day.....Maybe Not

Over the years, 81mgs of aspirin a day has been recommended to prevent cardiovascular events. Many of us have been taking this health preserving advice and this daily dose.

The thinking has changed with the most recent research though. Daily aspirin for primary prevention doesn't seem to decrease cardiovascular events in most people. The benefits have actually been offset by the risk of serious bleeding. Daily aspirin is actually an even greater risk for people with a diagnosis of a previous GI (gastro-intestinal) bleed, people who are on anti-coagulant medication, those taking daily NSAID (non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, think Motrin or Aleve) , and anyone with uncontrolled high blood pressure.

Now, if your provider has had a discussion with you, and together you have decided that daily aspirin use is indicated for you, please take it. Some of the indications for daily aspirin use are a previous MI or stroke, a coronary stent, peripheral artery disease or angina. In these cases the benefits clearly outweigh the bleeding risks.

If you have not had a discussion with your primary care provider about daily aspirin use, please initiate one. Also, remember that bleeding risks increase with age. Here's to the privilege of getting older and to your good health.

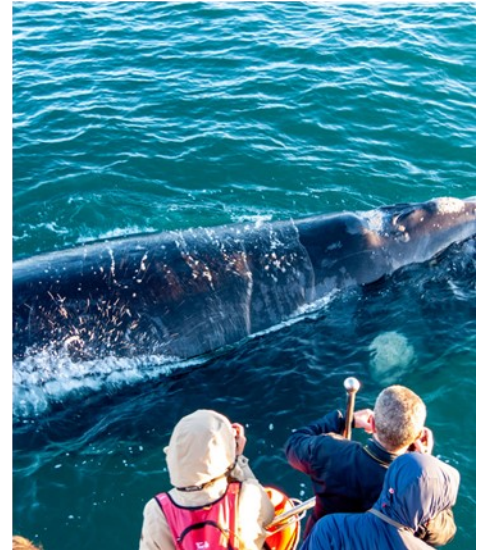

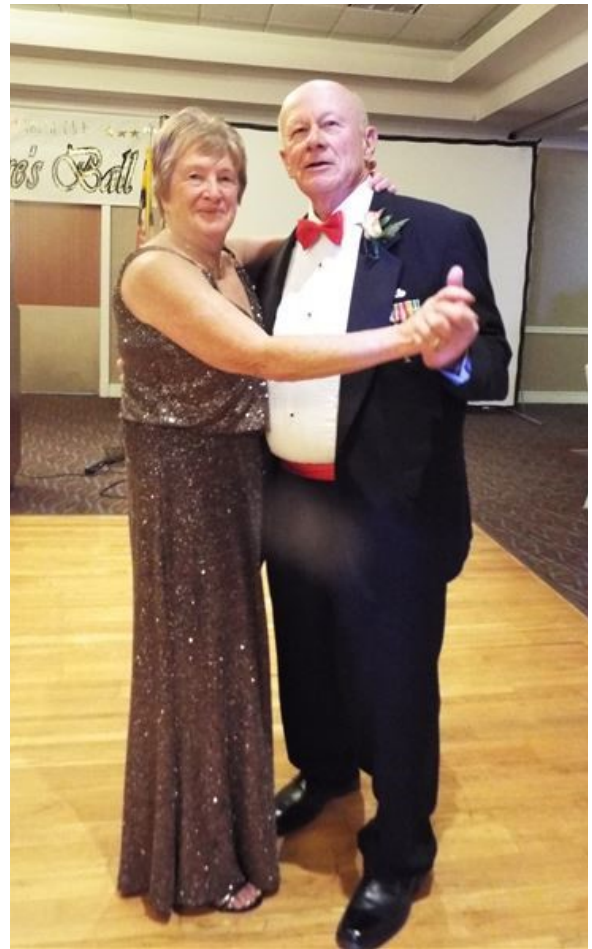

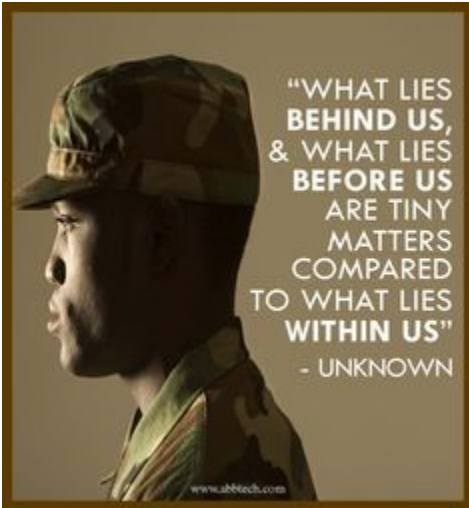

Veterans Day Sentimental Journey



Origin of the 21-Gun Salute

Perhaps you noticed that at 11:00 am on the 11th day of November (the 11th month) churches nationwide rang 21 Bells of Peace to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I. 21 signifies the nation's highest honor. That's why military funerals have a '21 gun salute'. Ever wonder why 21? Well I did; and here's what I found:

In the Anglo-Saxon Empire, seven guns was a recognized naval salute, seven being the standard number of weapons on a vessel. Because more gunpowder could be stored on dry land, forts could fire three rounds for every one fired from sea, hence the number 21. (In that day, powder of sodium nitrate was easier to keep on shore than at sea.) In time, when the quality of gunpowder improved by the use of potassium nitrate, the sea salute was made equal to the shore salute; 21 guns as the highest national honor.

The 21-gun salute was not formally adopted until August 18, 1875. This was at the suggestion of the British, who proposed a 'Gun for Gun Return' to their own 21-gun salute.

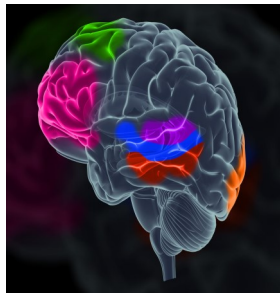

BAR ETIQUETTE



Tip big on the first round. In some circles it's common practice to leave a large tip on the first round. Depending on the bar, leave between 50-100% to make a good first impression—and build up the pot for the annual Volunteers Party. Some bartenders might think you want special treatment for leaving such a large tip. Don't act like the bartender owes you anything, and don't make a big deal about leaving a good tip.

Don't ask your bartender to slip you a little extra



Tip according to the drink. If you order a beer or a glass of wine, you can usually get away with tipping \$1. If you order a cocktail, tip a little more. The longer your bartender spends making your drink, the more you should tip them.

Don't hold your money at eye level



Leave a tip for every drink. If you're paying in cash, make sure to leave a tip for every drink. A good rule to follow is about \$1 a drink.

Don't call the bartender "pal" or "chief"



Be patient. Bartenders have a lot of customers to serve, and they have to give each one their full attention. Don't wave money at the bartender to get his or her attention. Just take your place in line, and wait your turn.

Don't follow the bartender down the counter



Order your drinks the right way. When the bartender approaches you for your order, be ready. Don't hold up the line trying to decide what you want.

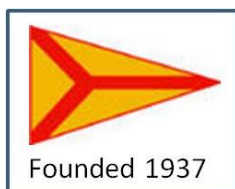
When ordering a mixed drink, start your order with the type of liquor you want. If you have a brand preference, say so. Don't say, "Can I get a Whiskey and Coke with Jack Daniels." Instead, say, "Can I get a Jack and Coke?"

Don't say: "Surprise me"

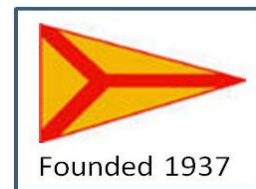

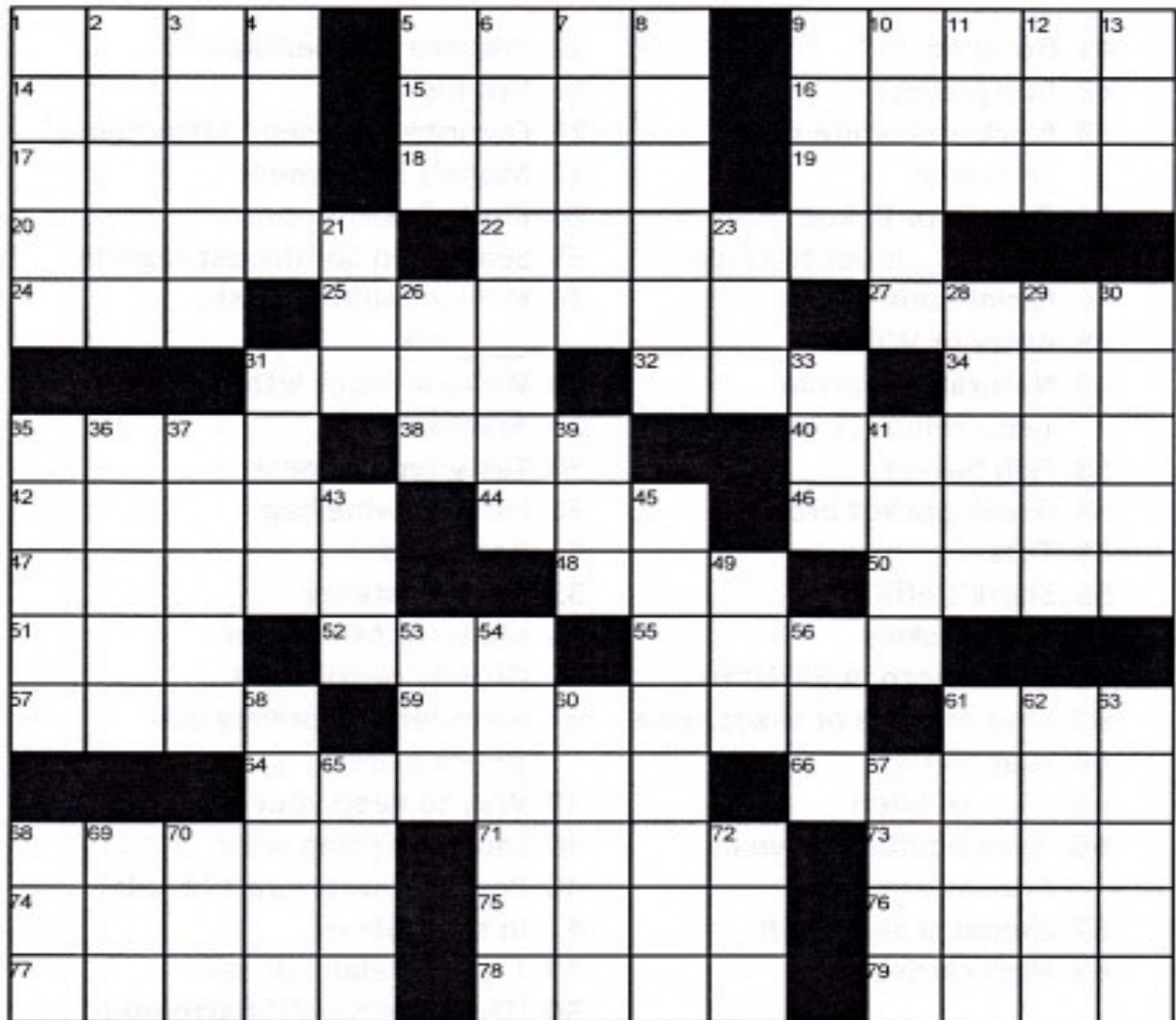
