Despite the ban on recreational boating, we are starting to see boaters lining up for visits to SIYC this summer. We've just added a visit by the Kent Island YC for Labor Day weekend as well as reservations for a number of transients. We also have finalized plans for the cruise to Miles River YC. If you haven't signed up, please do as soon as we reopen as space is limited.

While we await lifting of the ban, please take time to check your boat's safety systems. Are your flares outdated? How are your fire extinguishers? Do you need new life jackets? Check your fuel lines for leaks and your electrical connections for corrosion. The leading causes of fire on boats is electrical followed by leaky fuel lines.

Concerning flares, BOAT US is offering an electronic "flare" to members at a 10% discount. These are priced at under \$100 and are approved by the USCG. Meaning for the price of 9 flares you have a suitable approved replacement that only needs periodic replacement of the three alkaline c cells.

Like so many of us, Doug Smith is eating his way through the pandemic.



It took a pandemic!



Nancy Shumate Hazell being grateful that there may be light coming at the end of the tunnel.






SMILE


