The printed yearbooks are in and being distributed this year via curbside pickup since the Club is closed due to the coronavirus. This is a year of "firsts" for all of us, especially with the Club being closed and social distancing guidelines in place to protect us from getting the virus. In spite of these restrictions, a group came together to prepare the yearbooks for distribution. I'd like to give a huge "thank you" to the following volunteers who showed up with face masks on, practiced social distance guidelines by spreading out across the tables in the Captain's Lounge to place yearbooks in envelopes, add mailing labels, and place them in boxes in alphabetic order for ease of pick up. Please join me in thanking the following volunteers: Anita Shepherd, Anissa and Mike Stanton, Barbara Dove Whalen, Betsy Stoddard, Carolyn Keefe, Cindy Kobrine, P/C Gary Knight, Lucy Tonacci and Kat Tyrell.

Kat Tyrrell did an excellent job as usual in collecting information, sending it to the Graphic Designer and going through several rounds of edits to get the yearbook into a final digital file to send to the printer. To help Kat, P/C Craig Wilson volunteered to work with the business advertisers and did an admirable job in retaining and gathering new business advertisers this year. Also to give Kat a break, I volunteered to take over the printing and distribution processes. The yearbook printing was done within two weeks this year when in prior years it typically took 4 to 5 weeks to complete.

Since the Club has been closed, and due to the loss of income, several changes were required to reduce expenses. One such change was reducing the number of yearbooks printed, while insuring a yearbook would be available for each member household. The cost of an extra yearbook was increased to \$15.00 to cover the cost of creating and printing the yearbook. Members living out of the area, who'd like to have their yearbook mailed to them, will need to send an email request and prepay the postage expense due to the rising costs of mailing yearbooks that has increased to nearly \$8.00 per yearbook. Members with business ads and businesses that donated free gifts to the Club's Social Committee Chair will not automatically receive an extra yearbook. Businesses that donated gifts will instead receive a Thank You letter on SIYC letterhead that is signed by the Commodore and Susan Smith, last year's Social Committee Chair. Each business donor will also receive a digital copy of the yearbook.

In maintaining the CDC COVID-19 advice and following Governor Hogan's guidance, the yearbooks are being delivered curbside by member volunteers who are wearing face masks and gloves. Please join me in thanking all of the volunteers who've signed up for curbside delivery of the yearbooks. Since this project is ongoing at this time, the volunteer names will be identified in next month's Solomon Sez.

Fleet Captain's Corner

Thankfully, the Governor has lifted the stay at home order allowing us to go out on the water. With that in mind, the pier is open for you and transients. The following rules are in effect consistent with CDC guidelines and local rules.

LIMIT ONE PERSON IN THE BATHHOUSE AT A TIME TO ALLOW USE OF SANITIZER

TO USE THE BATHHOUSE, CRAB SHACK AND PICNIC TABLES YOU MUST:

- 1. Follow CDC Guidelines
- 2. No groups larger than 10

- 3. Maintain 6' social distancing
- 4. Wash hands or use hand sanitizer before and after use
- 5. Spray surfaces with sanitizer before and after use
- 6. Use of a mask is strongly recommended and required in all local businesses
- 7. If you are feeling ill please do not remain on the property

While boating the only people onboard should be members of your immediate family. Do not raft up or tie up at any restaurant or bar; sanitize your hands after handling fuel nozzles; while visiting a marina, ensure you socially distance from the staff.

Remember many marinas have not opened their ships store, so make sure you have adequate supplies before departing. You should travel directly to your boat and not stop on the way to or from to avoid possible infection. Lastly, wipe down all rails and ladders after boarding to ensure you have not brought the virus on board.

I hope that some of our cruises will occur. As you probably are aware, the cruise to Wicomico Opening Day was cancelled to avoid exceeding the ten-person limit. The next cruise is to Chesapeake YC, led by Matt Gambril. Due to the shutdown ordered by Governor Hogan, the renovation of the piers at the Chesapeake Yacht Club are way behind schedule. They asked we postpone the cruise to a later date since they only have a very limited number of slips operational. If anyone would like to go anyway they can accommodate one or two boats. The bathrooms are open, but the showers aren't. Food is available from the restaurant. For more information please contact the Club manager directly.
